





Kindness and respect

Families and teachers: the early childhood and primary school curricula encourage children to be kind and respectful to others.

You can encourage young children to be kind and respectful while playing, or while watching educational shows like *Sesame Street* together.



Watch together

While you're watching Sesame Street or other educational content together highlight ways that the characters are being kind and respecting each other.

- ☐ Elmo always asks kindly and says "thank you" and the characters at the Furchester Hotel help each other to solve problems, just like Super Grover helps others.
- ☐ Ask children to share ways they can be kind like their favourite characters!

Kindness throughout the day

- ☐ Model and point out kindness and respect throughout the day.
- Even though infants, toddlers and preschoolers might not be ready to share or demonstrate some other acts of kindness, children are never too young to be introduced to it.



Play and learn together

Help others

- ☐ Together, think of a simple way to help a classmate, friend or neighbour.
- ☐ You can do things like share toys, write them a nice letter, collect and donate clothes, and help them do chores.

Feelings

- ☐ Help children to notice different feelings they and others might have.
- ☐ Then, think about how they might help to comfort others or show empathy safely. You can even role play this first.
- ☐ Together, brainstorm safe ways to show affection or respect, and make amends in ways that are meaningful to children.

 They could use gestures like waves, high fives and special dances.



Talk together

Help children to be kind and respectful as you ask questions like:

- ☐ I notice that David seems sad. His mouth is turned down like a frown and he looks like he might cry. What could we say to him or do for him to help him?
- ☐ How could we show Laurie respect while we listen to her talk?
- What kind things have people done for you? What kind things can you do for others?
